

The First Ilgenfritzes of America

(As transcribed and edited from a copy of the original on February 17, 2009)

So far as we have been able to learn, the first Ilgenfritz, Johann Georg, his wife Maria Appellonia, and son Hans Georg, aged nine years, arrived in Philadelphia on October 8, 1737, on the "Charming Nancy" from Rotterdam. Their home appears to have been in the Province of Bavaria, Town of Ansbach near Nuremberg, Germany. (Hereafter we will use the English spelling: George)

They were part of a large wave of immigrants to the colonies from that area in the first half of the 18th century. Germany was a then group of autonomous states that were torn by religious wars and unsettled conditions. Earliest immigrants fled because of almost 100 years of devastation and uncertainty. William Penn went into southern Germany in 1671 and again in 1677 inviting Germans to settle in the vast area of southeastern Pennsylvania granted to him by the English crown.

The great majority of Germans who came to that area in the early days were of the reformed Lutheran faith. Immigrants landing in Philadelphia first settled in Germantown and then gradually moved west to and across the Susquehanna. Most of these Germans were skilled craftsman and farmers.

Johann George and his family settled in York County, Dover Township. The family, particularly the son George born in 1728 in Ansbach, were soon prosperous. When the son died in 1810 he had a large farm, a stone mill, a number of lots and houses in the town of Dover and York. An item in the minutes of York County Commissioners Court of January 29, 1754, states that he petitioned the court of a replacement of his lost certificate of tax collector for Dover Township. In this instance his name is spelled Elefrits.

An interesting historical sidelight of this George has been found. The book CONESTOGA WAGON deals with this historic means of early freight transport peculiar to the York-Lancaster area prior to the opening of the canals and railroads. It lists George Elefritz of York County as one of many who furnished a Conestoga wagon and teams for the ill-fated expedition of General Braddock against Fort Duquesne in 1755 during the French and Indian war. Benjamin Franklin had made a plea for the voluntary furnishing of the wagons as an alternative to requisitioning by the British army. Young Daniel Boone was listed among the wagoneers. George Washington led the militia.

ORIGIN OF THE NAME

Information on the origin of the Ellifrits in America is from the genealogical files of the York County (Pennsylvania) Historical Society. Duane Ellifritt located this source.

The name Ellifritt bears little resemblance to the name our ancestors bore when they came to this country - Ilgenfritz, which is said to mean "Elegant Fritz". Fritz, in turn, is a nickname for Frederick.

The first Ilgenfritzes seem to have come from what is now the Province of Bavaria, town of Ansbach near Nuremberg, 1737, landing at Philadelphia. In York County, where they first settled, there are no Ellifrits and few Ilgenfritzes today.

The change in spelling apparently came about among those who moved west and south from York County in the late 1700's and early 1800's. When the Germans pronounced Ilgenfritz, it apparently sounded like Ellifritz to the English who were keepers of the local government records.

Today there are many variations such as Elefrits, Ellifritt, Ellifritz, and Ellifrits.

The old York County clerk's record of deeds, dependent children, county court meetings and even the first US census in 1790, referred only to Elefrits and Ellifritz, and the like and rarely Ilgenfritz. At the same time, and invariably, the same people were listed in Lutheran and Moravian churches' records as Ilgenfritz. After about 1800 the Ilgenfritzes were probably able to establish their correct name in York, probably because their pronunciation became more Anglicized. Those Ilgenfritzes who left York in the 1700's seemed, invariably, to change their name to Ellifritz or a variation thereof.

THE CHARMING NANCY

The ship CHARMING NANCY, 115 tons, was built at Philadelphia and was registered there on 18 November 1736 to John Ste[a]dman (who was also the master), Alexander Andrew, and George Catanach, all of London.

Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography, 23 (1899), 383, where the tonnage is incorrectly given as "15".

The ship CHARMING NANCY, Charles Stedman, master, sailed from Rotterdam on 29 June 1737, arrived at Portsmouth 8 July 1737, sailed for Philadelphia on 17 July 1737, where she landed on 18 September; the passengers qualified on 8 October 1737.

Note that Wokeck, citing Pennsylvania Mennonite Heritage, vol. 2, p. 12, states that the 1737 account was written by Jacob Beiler, another passenger on the CHARMING NANCY; I have not researched this question. This was the first passage to bring large numbers of Amish to Pennsylvania. Three lists of passengers on this passage of the CHARMING NANCY survive in the Pennsylvania State Archives in Harrisburg: 1) the so-called "captain's list"; 2) the signatures or marks of those male passengers aged 16 years and older who subscribed to the oath of allegiance, and 3) the signatures or marks of those male passengers aged 16 years and older who subscribed to the oath of abjuration. All three lists have been published in Ralph Beaver Strassburger, Pennsylvania German pioneers; a publication of the original lists of arrivals in the port of Philadelphia from 1727 to 1808, edited by William John Hinke, Pennsylvania German Society, Proceedings 42-44 (3 vols.; Norristown, Penn., Pennsylvania German Society, 1934), vol. 1, pp. 188-194, lists 49A-C, respectively; facsimiles of the lists of signatures are published in vol. 2, pp. 193-198, lists 49B-C.

The CHARMING NANCY made one more passage from Rotterdam to Philadelphia carrying German immigrants, arriving in November 1738. No pictorial representation of the CHARMING NANCY is known to exist and her later history and ultimate fate are not known: while there are many references to vessels named CHARMING NANCY later in the 18th century the name is quite common, and without transfer-of-ownership records or other documentation it is impossible to determine which if any of these references concern the vessel of 1737. A North-American built vessel in service across the North Atlantic in the 18th century had a maximum estimated lifespan of about 20 years, so she almost certainly was not in service much past about 1756.

ILGENFRITZ Family History

(As transcribed from an internet genealogy webpage on February 17, 2009)

This is my family history on my Father's side. Thus the name Ilgenfritz. The history shows that Johann Georg Ilgenfritz Sr. came to the States in 1737 from Germany and landed in York Township, Pa. They lived in Pa. until about 1840 when they moved to Tipp. County, In. The history goes back to the Old Man Ilgenfritz in 1550.

O 59 York Co. PA. Probated 4/Aug/1823

Was a Soldier (pvt.) in Rev. War in Capt. John Ehrmans Militia. He fought in the battle of Long Island and at Brandy Wine, carried a bullet in leg for year and was a prisoner. He received bounty land in Mahoning Co. Ohio.

He was married to Anne Elizabeth ZINN (daughter of Phillip ZINN and Elizabeth BARTMESS) on 8 Apr 1783 in York Co. PA. Anne Elizabeth ZINN was born on 9 Dec 1762 in Conewago Twp. York Co. PA. She was christened on 26 Dec 1762 in Strayer Ref. Luth. Ch. Dover Twp. York Co. PA. She was buried in Aug 1845 in Salem Luth Cem. near Dover, York Co, PA. She died on 21 Aug 1845 in Conewago Twp. Seventh GENERATION

Johann Georg ILGENFRITZ was born on 25 May 1728 in Wornitz, Ansbach, Middle Franconia, Germany. He died on 11 Oct 1810 near Quickels Ch. Dover Twp. York Co. PA. He was buried on 14 Oct 1810 in Prospect Hill Cem. York, PA (Moravian Sec). He was a farmer, miller, constable. He was christened in Lutheran. Owned 300 acre farm in Dover Twp. York, York Co, PA from which he retired. Came to America 1737 with parents on Charming Nancy. Naturalized, Supreme Ct, of PA in Philadelphia, PA. On 21/Mar/1761 he took Sacrement. Naturalized 11/Oct/1761 along with Feisser, Frantz Berot, John Fishell and Jacob Lanius by Sacrament since they were Moravians. He joined Lutheran Church in Dover, York Co. PA 11/Jun/1757.

He was named Constable for Dover Twp. York Co, PA in 1753; Road supervisor in 1756 & 1758. He was taxed in the same Twp. in 1762 (7 Shillings, 6 pence) and seems to have been living in York, York Co, PA. in 1763. Hanover, York Co, PA

He died intestate. At the death of his father, in 1749, George inherited 100 acres & bought 200 more. He added to it until he owned much land, both in Manchester and Dover Twps - he also owned a mill, in Dover Twp. where he lived. At his death, in 1810, he left an estate (which the heirs fought over).

George probably saw some service in the Rev. War; on one muster roll is the name of George Fritz; and on another the name of George Ilgenfritz (Pa. Archives). George left no Will, but on Dec. 19, 1810, his estate came up in Orphan's Court (Intestate). Book K - Pgs. 176, 177 - York Co. Court records.

There was a 'Feud' going on among the Ilgenfritz families; it is thought to have been between the children of the 1st and 2nd wives of George (the 2nd), and they never associated in any way ... the young people were forbidden to meet. Eleanora (Elle) went to Baltimore, to visit her uncle, John Ilgenfritz, in 1836, and while there met her distant cousin, Jacob Ilgenfritz, Jr., who was also visiting ... and the young folks fell in love. Her folks opposed the marriage, and his mother was furious (his father was not living - having died in 1828) ... she forbid Jacob from seeing Ellen, and threatened what she would do if he did. So ... they eloped to Philadelphia and were married. Jacob began hunting work, he was a printer, but his mother hounded him, and got him discharged from every position he got. He tried for work of any kind, but it was winter, and there was none ... a baby was expected ... and still he could find no work ... he took cold ... it developed into pneumonia, and he died (from lack of medical attention, and malnutrition). Ellen's folks, hearing of her plight, went to Philidelphia, and took her back to York with them ... where her baby was born about three months later. Ann (Lau) Ilgenfritz refused to acknowledge the baby, and never helped Ellen and the baby in any way ... it is thought that she had much property ... the Laus were wealthy farmers of Manchester Twp., York Co., and she had inherited much wealth.

Eleanora (Ellen) (Ilgenfritz) Gartman, lived in York, Pa., until 1905, when she went out to the state of Washington - with her daughter, Fanny Spangenberg - to live with her granddaughter, Eleanora (Nelly) and Frank Dice, on a large farm, near Pres Washington (Walla Walla Co.)...where she died, Jan. 19, 1911, at the ripe old age of 97 (lacking ten days) - she is buried in the Dice family plot, City Cemetery, Waitsburg, Wash which is about five miles from the Dice home. Ellen was about 5 ft. 3 in. tall, weight ca. 120 lbs., light brown, wavy hair, medium blue eyes, fair skin. She had an active mind, with a keen sense of humor ... a good memory, and loved to tell stories of 'the good old days' ... she had a sunny disposition, a pleasing personality ... was a noted cook, seamstress and housekeeper.

George's Will probated 19/Dec/1810, Orphans Ct. York Co. PA, intestate. He had become a member of the Lutheran Church when he married Anna Maria Dorr Schertel. Joined the Moravian Church 11/Jun/1757 and left it in 1770

He was married to Margaretha MOHR (daughter of Peter MOHR and Catharine MATTHIAS) in Jun 1748 in Dover Twp. York Co. PA. Margaretha MOHR was christened about 1731 in Reformed Church. She was born on 15 Sep 1731 in Becherbach, Pfalz, Palatinate Germany. She died on 6 Apr 1769 near Quickels Ch. Dover Twp. York Co. PA. She was buried on 8 Apr 1769 in Prospect Hill Cem. York, PA (Moravian Sec). She was a Housewife. Was a Communion Sister XLIII. Died soon after stillborn delivery. Mother and daughter were buried together. Came to PA with parents, 1739 on "Samuel", from Rotterdam via Deal England to Philadelphia. Died age 38 yr. 5 mo.

Johann Georg ILGENFRITZ and Margaretha MOHR had the following children:

He was buried in Oct 1749 in Dover Twp. York Co. PA. He died on 13 Oct 1749 in Dover Twp. York Co. PA. He was a farmer. Came to America with wife and son John George on the Ship Charming Nancy and took the Oath of allegiance to King George II on 8/Oct/1737. They settled in Dover Twp. Lancaster (York) Co. PA and the 2 younger children were probably born there. Will was probated 13/Oct/1750 in York Co. PA. He signed name in German (Johann Georg Ilgafritz)

His name appears as George, Hans George, Johan George Iliafritz, Elefritz, Ilgafritz. depending on who wrote the name. The name is likely compounded of Elgan(t)Fritz and means Dandy, elegant or elite Frederick. Other spellings; ELIEFRETS, ELIEFREKS, ENTZLEG, ELLIENFRITZ, ELEFRIT, ILEFRITZ, INGELEFRITZ, HILLIGA FRITZ, HILIENFRITZ and JILGEN FRITZ.

This section of what was formerly West German now called Bavaria. In the 1700's it was called Middle Franconia.

During this time period in Germany there was a lot of religious persecution, wars and famine. One can only surmise that Andreas sent his son to America for a better life. Many German immigrants who came to America traveled along the Rhine river which runs into the Waal river which goes to

the city of Rotterdam The "Nancy" headed to Plymouth from there and then landed in Philadelphia, PA The ship carried 105 men, 25 boys and 107 women and girls. He settled in what was Dover Twp and is now Conewago Twp. Dover Twp was formed in 1749. The Twp. is drained by the Great Conewago Creek in the north, and the Little Conewago Creek in the southeast. The earliest settlers in this area came in 1736.

Bpsp. was John Michael Honig.

He was married to Barbara (Unknown) SCHNEIDER on 25 Jul 1682. Barbara (Unknown) SCHNEIDER was born of Waldhausen, Middle Franconia, Germany. She died in Germany. She was buried in Germany. Widow of Michel Schneider of Waldhausen. Maiden name unknown.
